he British production of Robin Hood (Robin of Sherwood, as it was originally marketed in the USA) is a fascinating blend of mysticism, history, myth and action. Although set in the 13th century when the Normans are still trying to cope with the recalcitrant Saxons, its main themes are contemporary—with a dash of the occult thrown in to keep matters interesting. The overall mood of mystery and the slightly fantastical is enhanced by the haunting music of Clannad, an Irish band. Excellent use of light and shadow as well as unusual setsalmost all outdoors-combine to make this series seem as legendary as its subject.

Richard (Kip) Carpenter (STARLOG #151), creator and major script writer of the series, wanted to create a Robin for the '80s. "I couldn't have a man who said, 'Follow me, men,' and they would just follow. He had to be brave yet vulnerable, tough enough to live off the land and strong enough to survive in Sherwood Forest, which was then nothing more than a deciduous, overgrown jungle of a place with no foot paths or clearings." Carpenter based his concept of Robin-whom, by the way, he doesn't really believe existed—on many men who were outlaws, anti-establishment and lived on their wits and petty thievery. Skillfully weaving myth and wizardry, Carpenter created a new version of Robin Hood, using the legendary figure of Herne, the Horned God of the Forest, who "chooses" Robin as his "son" to lead the common people against those who would oppress them.


"People in those days believed in magic and superstition just as today's kids readily accept the modern equivalent, technology which produces robots, computers and lasers...any man who joined Robin's band had to be prepared to face the unseen forces of Light and Darkness. If a man could survive in Sherwood Forest, he could

survive anything."

And survive he did—even through a change of actors! As the first two seasons were being successfully completed, the lead actor, Michael Praed (STARLOG #127), was offered a too-good-to-pass-up role in a Broadway musical version of The Three Musketeers.

When Praed accepted, the producers and Carpenter had to come up with a reason for the sudden switch. Since the show was based on an acceptance of the occult, it was decided that Herne would select another "son." Thus, the series keep faith with both legends that have grown up about Robin-one, that he was the yeoman's son of a village Thane and two, that he was an aristocrat, the Earl of Huntingdon's son. No matter which, he was Robin of Sherwood.



lage of Loxley in Medieval England by the Normans. Protesting, he's placed in the care of a miller while his father, Ailric, rides on to a circle of standing stones to bury the sacred "Silver Arrow" entrusted to him. Overtaken by soldiers, Ailric is killed and the "Silver Arrow" stolen. Some years later, the people of Nottingham are held in the grip of evil forces and the young boy, Robin of Loxley, now a young man, is chosen by Herne the Hunter, god of the forest, as the reluctant savior of the common people.

Robin, escaping from prison in Nottingham Castle, forms a band with other displaced men and former prisoners in Sherwood Forest. Together in the primeval depths of the forest, where things are not always what they seem, they decide to fight the evil Sheriff of Nottingham. At the same time, the Baron de Belleme targets Lady Marion of Leaford for his occult schemes. He already holds enthralled a giant of a man whom Robin meets, fights and successfully breaks free of de Belleme's spell. And so, "Little" John joins Robin. Magical forces, Robin's cunning and Herne's cryptic riddles all combine to help defeat de Belleme's sorcery, rescue the Lady Marion and arm Robin with the power of the sword Albion. Robin and Marion are "wed" by Herne. (The character of Nasir was changed during the filming from a one-time appearance to an ongoing role.)

#### "The Witch of Elsdon"

If she betrays Robin and his outlaws, he'll pardon her and her man. If she refuses—death by slow torture. Jennet agrees, seeks refuge with Robin and puts a sleeping potion into the band's drink, overpowering them all. Only Marion refuses to partake; she's annoyed that Robin won't let her participate in the raids since she's a woman. Herne sends her a warning and when Guy enters the camp, he has a most unwelcome surprise. So does the Sheriff when Robin appears on his doorstep, demanding a pardon for Jennet and her man.

#### "Seven Poor Knights From Acre"

Seven Knights Templar return from the Holy Land and, while camping near Sherwood, find their golden emblem has been stolen. Unless Robin returns the emblem—which he doesn't have—Much will be killed.

#### "Alan-a-Dale"

Robin, as befits a bowman, is asked to play Cupid and rescue a minstrel's lady from a most unpleasant fate—becoming Mrs. "Sheriff of Nottingham." Robin already has trouble: Little John was seen in the village of Wickham and a heavy fine has been levied on the villagers for not turning him in. Robin attempts to rescue the girl, rob the Sheriff of her dowry for the villagers, and dispatch some very angry guests on the Sheriff.

# "Richard the Lionhearted" (a.k.a. "The King's Fool")

"Good" King Richard returns to England after a stay in a German prison. The outlaws rescue him from a band of vagabonds. The King's gratitude seems boundless, as are his pardons. But perhaps the King is really a bounder and Robin's being a bit gullible. ("You were the Hooded Man...now you're the King's fool.") Soon, Robin and Marion flee from the King's treachery. Struck by one of their pursuers' arrows, Marion collapses at the place where Robin's father died. Is Herne's power great enough to rescue her from death?


